MCVG Commissioner Honored with PRESIDENTIAL LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

On Feb. 10, 2023, AmeriCorps, the federal agency for national service and volunteerism, and Volunteer Mississippi, the Mississippi Commission for Volunteer Service, awarded the Presidential Lifetime Achievement Award (PVSA) to William "Quint" Withers, V for contributing thousands of hours of volunteer service.

Withers, a commissioner and former board chair for Volunteer Mississippi, has served the Jackson Metropolitan Area and his country for the last two decades through community service and engagement. Collectively, Withers has attained over 4,000 hours serving with the Mississippi Commission for Volunteer Service, Youth United Way,

Mississippi Book Festival, Mississippi Symphony Orchestra, Mississippi Hearts against AIDS, Millsaps College Alumni Association, Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) Youth Leadership Development Program, and AmeriCorps NCCC, to name a few.

Holding many leadership positions throughout his lifetime, Withers is an example in leading others by serving. He shepherds volunteers, actively listening to those serving alongside himself and translating their needs and ideas into action. All of Withers' service is notable, and Volunteer Mississippi is thankful to have Withers as a part of its board.

"Quint has a servant's heart with a special affinity for National Service," said Adrian Austin and Suzanne Scales-Rutherford, interim co-executive directors for Volunteer Mississippi. "A true advocate for community engagement, he has the humanitarian spirit needed for this work. Quint has provided his considerable expertise, compassion and generous spirit to our organization and others time and time again."

Withers' volunteerism around the community and state has impacted lives, and his legacy of service will make a difference in Mississippi for years to come. For Withers, service is a lifestyle, and he is inspired by seeing others work together in volunteerism.

"From my years of serving, I hold in great respect Mississippians of all ages for their remarkable gift in giving back in service to improve lives and strengthen communities," Withers said. "Your service challenges me daily to continue giving of myself to others. Being of service to others is what brings us true joy and happiness."

Led by AmeriCorps and managed in partnership with Points of Light, the President's Volunteer Service Award allows organizations to recognize their most exceptional volunteers based on service over a 12-month period or a lifetime. The President's Volunteer Service Award program began in 2003 and honors individuals whose service positively impacts communities in every corner of the nation and inspires others to act. Award tiers include Bronze (100-174 hours), Silver (175-249 hours), Gold (250+ hours) and Lifetime Achievement (4,000+ hours).

GULFPORT ROADSHOW

Volunteer Mississippi hit the road this year. On May 17, we began our Roadshow Training Tour. Here, we welcomed leaders from nonprofits and organizations around the coastal area to join us in learning more about Volunteer

Mississippi, AmeriCorps Mississippi, and volunteer management. Tobi Johnson, MA, CVA, an expert in volunteer management and training, facillitated discussion on effectively engaging volunteers in diverse settings. Participants were encouraged in their mission and challenged to continue innovatively serving their communities.

Our first roadshow gave organizations an opportunity to connect with our agency while networking with colleagues in the nonprofit and service sector. Our roadshows continue in fiscal year 2024 with stops around the state. We are excited to see our efforts continue impacting Mississippi organizations.





MINI-GRANT RECIPIENTS

Volunteer Mississippi periodically offers mini-grants to support Mississippi nonprofits and organizations making a difference in their communities. These mini-grants are available to registered 501(c)(3) nonprofits in the state of Mississippi. Funds are available to offset costs involved with projects or events engaging Mississippians of all ages and backgrounds in service to their communities.



Big House Books

Big House Books sends books to incarcerated Mississippians. During the grant period, BHB hosted weekly book packing parties where volunteers packaged 674 packages containing 2,022 books. Grant money funded postage for packages of books.



One by One Ministries

One by One Ministries partners mentor moms with pregnant and new moms who are seeking Christian community. One by One recruited volunteer mentors and participants with its mini-grant.




The Refill Jackson Initiative

The Refill Jackson Initiative (RJI) empowers Jackson young adults seeking an improved quality of life with tailored support and job training. Volunteers built Mel's Corner, a park funded by our mini-grant memorializing Mel Groves, an RJI alumus.



Rise Disaster Relief & Recovery, Inc.

Rise bridges the gap between federal disaster relief and the ongoing needs of impacted communities. Grant money supported volunteer efforts after the March tornadoes in Rolling Fork and Amory.



Rosie's Garden

Rosie's Garden allows volunteers to cultivate, grow, harvest, and deliver produce to those in need. During the grant period, volunteers planted new gardens, hosted workshops, harvested, and more.

MARCH DISASTERS

n March 24, 2023, at approximately 8:04 p.m., the city of Rolling Fork was hit by an EF-4 tornado. The tornado, which first touched down in Issaquena County as an EF-1 categorized twister, strengthened rapidly and



remained on the ground for nearly an hour, moving through Rolling Fork, Midnight, and Silver City, leaving disaster in the wake of its sixty-mile track. According the the National Weather Service in Jackson, over 70% of Rolling Fork and over 95% of Silver City faced damage from the tornado.

Just after 10:30 p.m. that night, the same storm supercell that produced the Rolling Fork tornado produced another that devastated Monroe County. This EF-3 tornado traveled nearly 40 miles and left significant damage, especially to the communities of Egypt, New Wren, and Amory. While these are the two most significant tornadoes born from the March 24 severe storms, multiple other cities faced large amounts of destruction, whether from tornadoes or straight-line winds.

As soon as search-and-rescue efforts were over, Mississippi volunteers arrived in areas affected by the storms to provide aid. Volunteer Mississippi led the charge in receiving and managing



these volunteers to provide a unified, swift response alongside our partner disaster agencies: the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency, Cajun Navy Ground Force and Mississippi Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster.

Volunteers supported relief efforts through many avenues, from donating water and supplies to helping with rebuilding efforts. At the Volunteer Reception Center, our staff was moved by the dedication these volunteers had to

helping, and we were honored to help them find their place to serve.

Mississippi's March disasters drew national attention, and volunteers came from every corner of the United States to lend a hand in rebuilding Mississippi. National news agencies including The New York Times, The Washington Post, and Fox News, covered the tornadoes and response efforts, with Volunteer Mississippi being featured as the liaison for volunteers.

After the catastrophic events in March, Mississippi communities banded together as they do in times of need. Volunteer Mississippi was proud to be a part of

the efforts to respond to needs in the aftermath. Mississippi proves its strength time and time again but especially in disaster response.

We are grateful for Mississippi's giving spirit that provides life-saving help in times of disaster.

Reading & Math Corps

Reading & Math Corps believes that every student deserves an opportunity to succeed through proficiency in reading and math. Members serve as tutors who support readers in kindergarten through third grade and math students in fourth-eighth grade.



AmeriCorps promotes service 365 days of the year, but on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and 9/11 Day of Service and Remembrance, AmeriCorps hosts National Days of Service.

These days place a special emphasis on national service, inviting AmeriCorps members and volunteers alike to honor the day through serving. From food drives to writing letters to armed forces members, National Days of Service are an opportunity to

remember national leaders and events while making a difference in communities.

On 9/11 Day of Service and Remembrance, Americans across the country are called to volunteer in tribute to the individuals lost and injured in the attacks, first responders, and the many who have risen in service to defend freedom. 9/11 Day of Service offers the opportunity to cross divides, differences, and ideologies to serve with neighbors and strangers alike to build important bridges in communities

around the nation.

This year, AmeriCorps Mississippi programs honored 9/11 Day of Service and Remembrance through showing gratitude for local first responders and service members. AmeriCorps members wrote letters of thankfulness for their sacrificial service and hand delivered them to first responders around their communities. Members were able to show their gratitude firsthand and hear from first responders about their experiences.





MLK Day of Service honors Dr. King's legacy by working toward a more just and equitable society where everyone is valued and respected, regardless of their race, ability, religion, or background. Participating in service projects helps bridge divides, heal wounds, and create lasting change that will benefit our communities for years to come. During the last quarter-century, the MLK Day of Service has grown, and its impact increased as more Americans

embraced the idea that citizenship involves taking an active role in improving communities.

This MLK Day of Service, AmeriCorps Mississippi programs promoted health efforts, community engagement projects, civic involvement, and civil education. Programs served in multiple projects including assisting with a Unity Run and Walk for Health, serving at an MLK breakfast and parade, and serving with "Committee for the King" which provides resources about the civil rights movement and Dr. King.

ach year, Volunteer Mississippi makes a point to celebrate the outstanding service of Mississippians through the Governor's Initiative for Volunteer Excellence Awards (GIVE Awards). In April, which is Volunteer Appreciation Month, governmental officials, MCVS Commissioners, community leaders, and more gather to learn about volunteer work happening in Mississippi.

Recipients are chosen by a panel of judges based on nominations. Anyone can be nominated for a GIVE Award, and anyone can nominate for a GIVE Award. Nominations open in January of each year. The 2023 GIVE Awards received a record 130 nominations,
